# Interview 'I was an awe-struck Williams fan, now I run the team'

James Vowles might be called 'The Reverend' by rivals but heads to British GP preaching the return of his iconic outfit

James Vowles remembers the first time he went to Silverstone as if it was yesterday. He and his friend Luciano, with whom he grew up in Geneva, went on what he calls "something of a pilgrimage" to the circuit. By chance Williams were testing that day.

circuit. By chance Williams were testing that day.

"I remember the sound, I remember the feeling, I remember the vibrations in my chest," Vowles says. "We stood there for half an hour, on the fence, just in awe. This would have been 1996 or 1997, when I was I7 or 18. It was basically that famous Rothmans Williams car. That's what we were looking at and it was fantastic. I've still got the photos somewhere."

It is funny how life turns out.
What would Vowles have said if someone had told him that nearly 30 years later he would return to

30 years later he would return to Silverstone for the British Grand Prix as team principal of Williams, charged with returning the oncegreat team to former glories?

"I simply wouldn't have believed you," he says. "I couldn't even come to terms with the fact that I was seeing a Formula One car, let alone come to terms with the fact that I might one day work in the sport. As

come to terms with the fact that I might one day work in the sport. As for running Williams..." Vowles laughs at the absurdity of it.

The 46-year-old had an unusual entry to the sport. Growing up in Switzerland, he attended the International School of Geneva, and speaks fluent French.

speaks fluent French.

The sliding doors moment came when Vowles returned to Britain to read maths and computer science at the University of East Anglia. "I woke up one day and realised I was

woke up one day and realised I was not happy. I wanted to change my direction of travel," he recalls.

He applied to all II FI teams at the time, and received II rejection letters, all of which he pinned up on his wall. Crucially, two of those rejection letters - from BAR and Williams - came with explanations. "They basically said that I had an interesting background but I interesting background but I needed engineering as well to be

employable."
He promptly applied to Cranfield
University and did a master's degree in Motorsport Engineering

and Management.

and Management.
The rest is history. From BAR, to Brawn GP, to Mercedes, where Vowles was a key figure in a team who won eight consecutive constructors' titles and seven drivers' titles, and now finally Williams.
"It's been an incredible ride and I consider myself so fortunate," he says. "Even five years ago, I don't think I believed I would be a team principal. I trusted Toto [Wolff]. Toto was the one who really

directed me and said 'You will be a team principal'."
Listening to Vowles, you cannot help but be struck by his earnest-ness. He can actually be very funny, but you suspect that it is this ear-nestness this reputation as strait-

but you suspect that it is this ear-nestness, this reputation as strait-laced and boffiny, which has made him an unlikely fans' favourite. His famous radio message when he was at Mercedes - "Valtteri, it's James" - which always spelt doom for Finnish driver Bottas when he was about to be used as a sarrificial for Finnish driver Bottas when he was about to be used as a sacrificial lamb for Lewis Hamilton, has become a meme. Comedian Jack Whitehall, meanwhile, had great fun at this year's season launch at the O2, calling Vowles "Jimmy V" and "the rizzmaster", and saying he could not wait to do espresso marti-

nis with him at the after-party. "Jack is hilarious... he warned me beforehand and I found it very performing and I found it very funny." When Whitehall visited the Miami race they had espresso mar-tinis together. "His was laced with alcohol, mine was not."

Vowles does not even object to Christian Horner calling him "The Reverend Vowles" in the Netflix series Formula 1: Drive to Survive. What was that about? "I have no idea," Vowles smiles, before admitting he suspects it might have to do with his verbosity and mannerisms. "Do I think, at times, I overexplain answers? Yes. That's a negative trait and something I probably need to work on'. And the second part of it is, yeah, I do try to act with virtue. I will do things with honesty

and transparency. But I didn't take it as an insult."

it as an insult."

It is an endearingly earnest response, which both makes Horner's point and shows Vowles in a positive light.

Whatever the reason, as we

whatever the reason, as we arrive at Silverstone this weekend, one can feel the goodwill of fans towards both Vowles and Williams. They want this to work. They want the return of a British icon to the

top. What a story it would be.
Vowles describes himself as a "competitive psychopath" and you can feel that when he talks about his plans for taking Williams to the front of the grid, the hours he is prepared to put in, even his relation-ship with his wife Rachel, a surgeon. He recalls their first date in 2019. "I was like, 'I've got to warn you, my work is my life, and I work really long hours'. And she was like, 'No, I work really long hours', And I

'No, I work really long hours', And I was like, 'No, no, no. I work really long hours'. We actually went through it. And to be fair, Formula One still trumps it, but only just. "My wife is unbelievable. She's one of the best surgeons in the UK. A double first from Oxford who then worked in A&E in Whitechapel, then trained in plastics and preast cancer. So quite a unique breast cancer. So quite a unique individual in that she can diagnose breast cancer and then do the mastectomy and a rebuild after-wards. Honestly, it's life-changing stuff. I just work in F1. She's the

clever one."

The couple, who live in Oxford, have a daughter Elodie, who arrived 19 months ago. They are expecting their second child this week, which could mean an emergency dash from Silverstone. "As you can imagine with me, I have contingencies," he says. "I've got plans upon plans... so we are sorted, including helicopters on standby and all sorts!"

Nothing, though, will stop him returning Williams to the top. Although the Grove team are still behind Fi's biggest beasts in terms of infrastructure, change is coming. Williams have the backing of American private investment firm Dorilland Capital and Vayles sees proton Capital, and Vowles sees no reason why they cannot be winning

races by 2028.

He rejects talk that Williams are no longer Williams, with co-founder Sir Frank now gone and no one from his family involved. "The DNA is absolutely still Williams. And while I'm here we will not lose the family feel. That is really important to me

tant to me."
What if his mentor Wolff wants him back at Mercedes? Or Ferrari or McLaren come calling? He considers the question."I really feel this is where I'll end my career," he says. "It was the proudest moment of my life walking through the door at Williams. I have a once invalife. Williams. I have a once-in-a-life-time opportunity in a team with time opportunity in a team with legacy beyond pretty much every team, to bring it back to the front. I'm happy looking everyone in the eyes and saying, 'This is where I want to be. This team can be world champions. And I'll be here when we do that!"

# Russell: Verstappen will not replace me this year

George Russell says the chances of him not being a Mercedes driver next year are "exceptionally low", adding he expects Kimi Antonelli to remain as his team-mate. The Englishman, 27, is under-stood to have been assured by Mer-cedes team principal Toto Wolff that a new contract is on the way.

that a new contract is on the way. "The likelihood I'm not at Mercedes next year is, I think, exceptionally low," Russell said on

Thursday. "I personally think things will continue as they are. But

again, until the contract is on the table on my side, and also for Kimi, you can never be sure."

Russell was speaking ahead of this weekend's British Grand Prix, where he will attempt to make it two wins in two years for Mercedes following Lewis Hamilton's tri-umph 12 months ago.

Paddock intrigue ahead of the race has once again focused on a story which has been bubbling away for months, but which really exploded in Austria last week after Russell implied the hold-up to his contract extension was because

Mercedes were investigating the possibility of signing Verstappen. Russell all but confirmed on

Thursday that he would be staying. Whether his deal will be just a one

year extension for 2026, leaving the door open for Verstappen to join in his place in 2027, or whether Ver-stappen comes in for Antonelli next

season or the season after, to form season or the season after, to form what would be a blockbuster partnership with Russell, remains to be seen. Russell added yesterday that he would have no issue in going up against Verstappen.

"I wouldn't be surprised if he comes," he said. "And if he comes I'd welcome him as a team-mate." But I don't think he will be at Mercedes next year. I'm not scared of

cedes next year. I'm not scared of Max. He's obviously an amazing driver in the same way Lewis [Ham-

ilton] was an amazing driver."

The two have had their differences in the past, with Verstappen calling Russell a "loser" and Russell saying Verstappen was a "bully".

But Russell said they could work together. "We're professionals," he said. "I don't think you need to be best friends to be team-mates. You

best friends to be team-mates. You just need to be amicable."

Verstappen, for his part, played down reports that he wanted to leave Red Bull. The Dutch driver is believed to have a break clause in his contract - which officially runs until 2028 - allowing him to leave if he is outside of the top three come the summer break.
"I am happy and comfortable."

"I am happy and comfortable where I am at," he told Sky Sports Fl. Asked if he might take a sabbatical next year, Verstappen was emphatic: "No, no, for sure not."

# Russell says he 'won't be going anywhere' amid Verstappen talk

Mercedes driver confident of new contract as FIA president faces a rival in re-election bid

George Russell believes he "won't be going anywhere" and is likely to have a new contract confirmed with Mercedes as he played down suggestions that he could lose his seat to Max Verstappen

As he prepared for this weekend's British Grand Prix, Russell, whose contract with Mercedes has yet to be renewed, said he thought the chances of him not being with the team next season were "exceptionally low" Verstappen, in turn, flatly refused to comment on the matter.

The speculation came on a day when there was more flux at the top of the sport as a challenge emerged to the authority of the president of the FIA, Mohammed Ben Sulayem, with the news that the former FIA steward Tim Mayer will stand against the president in elections later this year.

On Wednesday, there were unconfirmed reports that Verstappen's talks with Mercedes have intensified and that a deal was close to being confirmed. However, it is understood this remains entirely speculation and that Mercedes are still conducting consideration of advances made toward them from the Verstappen camp.

Russell was considered more likely

to lose his seat than his teammate Kimi Antonelli were a deal to be done with Verstappen, but at Silverstone the Briton was bullish about his position. "I've been focused on my side, I am loyal to Mercedes, so at the end of the day, everything will work itself out," he said. "And the likelihood I'm not at Mercedes next year, I think is

exceptionally low.
"For me it's nothing to worry about as I don't think I'll be going anywhere and whoever my teammate is doesn't concern me either, so I'll just focus on the driving. There's a lot of conversa-tions behind the scenes that are not public and I know where their [Mercedes's] loyalty lies. I'm performing better than ever, it's as simple as that, performance speaks for everything."

Mercedes are unlikely to announce any decision until the summer break after the Hungarian Grand Prix on 3 August, which is the point when potential exit clauses in Verstappen's contract would become applicable. The Dutchman did not deny the talks were taking place but declined to make any further comment.

It also became clear yesterday at Silverstone that Mayer will announce his candidacy to oppose Ben Sulayem for the FIA presidency this morning in a press conference. The 59-yearold American was a long-serving FIA steward, well-liked and respected until he was sacked last November after a dispute between the governing body and the organisers of the US Grand Prix, for whom Mayer was working in an independent capacity.

Mayer claimed the dismissal had taken place because Ben Sulayem personally took umbrage at him and he was highly critical of how it had been handled. "In spite of the mat-ter being resolved quietly and amicably, he's still upset and decided to fire me," he said. "After 15 years of volunteering my time as a steward, a decade teaching other stewards and hundreds of hours volunteering in other roles, I got a text from one of his assistants." The FIA denied he had been told by text message.

Mayer, the son of the McLaren cofounder Teddy Mayer, has enjoyed senior roles in Champ Car, the International Motor Sports Association and the American Le Mans Series. and was a chair of FIA's stewards.

His standing presents a credible threat to Ben Sulayem's position. The Emirati has overseen four years of highly controversial governance at the FIA but has already announced his intention to stand for re-election, the voting for which will take place on 12 December.

It is understood Mayer already has the requisite selection of senior figures who would join him in key positions, which is required by candidate, and now faces the serious task of winning support from the motor sport associations that will decide the vote in December.

#### Russell brushes off Verstappen to Mercedes

George Russell says he "won't be going anywhere" as he played down suggestions that he could lose his Mercedes seat to Max Verstappen.

Mercedes team principal Toto Wolff again opened the doors last weekend to luring the fourtime world champion away from Red Bull and hinted he could be eyeing up an explosive Verstappen-Russell pairing.

Speculation has increased throughout the week, with talk turning to the 27-year-old Russell being the man under pressure. Both Russell and his 18-year-old team-mate Kimi Antonelli do not have contracts in place for next season but, speaking ahead of his home Grand Prix, the British driver was adamant that he will be driving for Mercedes in 2026.

"Of course there's lots of conversations, lots of rumours. All of these are being pointed towards me, but from my side that isn't really going to be the case," Russell said at Silverstone.

"I want to continue with Mercedes into the future. The fact is, Toto has never let me down. He's always given his word but he's also got to do what's right for his team.

"For me, it's nothing to worry about because I don't think I'll be going anywhere. Who my teammate will be doesn't concern me either, so I'll just focus on the driving."
Russell has had an impres-

Russell has had an impressive season, highlighted by his victory in Canada, and sits fourth in the drivers' standings.

Verstappen and Russell have a rocky history, embroiled in a vicious war of words in Abu Dhabi last December before the Dutchman accelerated into his rival at this season's Spanish Grand Prix.

"Every team has two seats available and it's normal that every team is considering what the future holds," Russell added. "I don't take that personally."

# SILVERSTONE'S MUSIC DRIVE: 'WE'RE A SERIOUS VENUE'

Ahead of this week's F1 British Grand Prix festivities, chief commercial officer Nick Read reveals the circuit's huge concert goals

Silverstone is stepping up its ambitions to become a standalone music venue as it gears up for this weekend's 2025 Formula 1 British Grand Prix.

The famous Northamptonshire motor racing circuit is staging four huge nights of live music between 3-6 July, featuring an all-British lineup headlined by Sam Fender, Raye, Fatboy Slim and Becky Hill. Support will also be provided by Blossoms, Jade, Mabel and Idris.

The annual series expanded to four nights last year and reconfigured its music arena layout with an increased capacity of 60,000, solidifying itself on the UK outdoor calendar.

"Music is an absolutely integral, non-negotiable part of our weekend now," Silverstone's chief commercial officer Nick Read tells *IQ*. "We've gone from a three-day to a four-day motorsport and music festival, and you can see [the impact] on our attendance. Last year, we had a record attendance of over 480,000 and this year, we'll probably be closer to 500,000."

The music programme, which was headed by Stormzy, Kings of Leon, Pete Tong and Rudimental in 2024, is provided at no extra cost to GP ticket-holders, although Thursday evening concert tickets are available from £60 (€70). Silverstone curates the content internally and uses an external booker for the headline artists.

"We're a serious music venue, and we can effectively give sellout audiences to those artists," says Read. "The music is included in our ticket price, so the fans get better value. We can guarantee to the musicians they will get between 50,000 to 60,000 people to perform to."

Each night will also include an Afterparty headliner: Eats Everything, DJ Luck & MC Neat, Sub Focus and Mike Skinner of The Streets. Separately, Hill will perform the National Anthem before the start of Sunday's Grand Prix, with Fatboy Slim also set to play on the grid prior to the race.

"It's the 75th anniversary of the British Grand Prix so I'm delighted that all of the acts across the weekend will be British, but it's really just about musicians who can connect and engage with the crowd," says Read. "Last year, Stormzy gave one of the most amazing performances I've ever seen and two years ago, we had Calvin Harris, who was also incredible.

"A lot of circuits tend to have their headline music acts towards the Saturday or Sunday of an event. What we've done is turn it on its head. Music is so important to us now that we have extended our festival to four days. We want artists that have strong recognition and a broad appeal, acts that deliver energy and production at scale."



Read credits the Netflix documentary Formula 1: Drive to Survive for introducing the sport to a new demographic.

"You've got an evolving audience," he says. "Fans want more than racing now, and we want to increase the dwell time to give maximum value for money but you've got this cultural shift from things such as *Drive to Survive*. That has generated a much broader, younger audience. People want to be entertained throughout the day, and not just through the motorsport.

That new fanbase is very much influenced by the music. For example, you can buy just a Thursday ticket just to come along and see the concert, and we sell thousands of those."

He continues: "When we promote Formula 1 now, we're not just promoting it as the British Grand Prix. We've got 16 acts on our main stage this year and have now introduced a second stage with capacity for 12,000 people. We've got to be relentless in what we're striving for, whether we go from four days to five days – another standalone day of music could be a possibility. Maybe we can bring more artists in through the day. We keep thinking big."

Library Productions, which manages Glastonbury's Pyramid Stage, created bespoke staging for the expanded music arena. And aligning with Silverstone's vision to be a 365-day sport, business and leisure destination, Read is hopeful the race track can become "not just known for motorsport" but as a regular, seasonal concert venue beyond the F1 weekend.

"We are an incredible motorsport circuit, but also have this incredible infrastructure right in the heart of England," he says. "We can do a standalone festival, or several nights of shows, so that's really our next stage – music, without motorsport."

F1 was acquired in 2017 by Live Nation shareholder Liberty Media, which spun off its LN stake into a new live division last year. The After-Race Concerts have long been a key part of the festivities at F1's Abu Dhabi Grand Prix weekend, which has confirmed Benson Boone, Elyanna, Post Malone, Metallica and Katy Perry for Yas Island from 4-7 December. Meanwhile, performances by the likes of Usher, Major Lazer Soundsystem and Jennifer Lopez lit up April's Saudi Arabian Grand Prix festivities in April.

"As circuit promoters, we've taken inspiration from within the F1 fraternity," adds Read. "The Middle East has big artists, but also look at Austin in America – they've also been early adopters of music within Formula One. I talk to the other promoters, and we've all seen the benefit of embracing music and integrating it into our festivals."
